- Double check to make sure you are logged in to your Google account through Talkatone.

• Enter Settings, and make sure the "Call Forwarding" option is set to Google

- Wait for an incoming call, or test this yourself by calling your Google Voice number from another device.
- Now anyone who calls your Google Voice number will automatically be forwarded to your iPad. And don't worry about missing calls - Google Voice automatically

keeps a record of your calls, and allows callers to leave messages.

headset – you'll have to answer them manually with your iPad.

Notes, Tips and Suggestions

If you already have a Google Voice account that forwards to your cell phone, office phone or somewhere else, it might be worth setting up a second Google account (and a second Google Voice account) just for your iPad.

You can use a standard Apple headset with microphone to handle your calls. You can also use a Bluetooth headset, but you won't be able to answer calls using the
